RE: Request for Commutation of Sentence of Death to Life in Prison
on Behalf of Christa Gail Pike

Dear Governor Lee:

As organizations, scholars, individuals, law clinics, and survivors who are dedicated to ending all forms of violence against women, we are writing to urge you to commute the death sentence of Christa Pike to life imprisonment. At the time of the crime for which she was sentenced to death, Christa was an eighteen-year-old survivor of child sexual abuse and rape. It is vital that you understand the significance of her history, and its relationship to the crime she committed, in weighing whether the State of Tennessee should execute her.

Through our work, we have heard many accounts of gender-based violence, including child sexual abuse, rape, and intimate partner violence. From our work with victims, we also know that these experiences can have devastating consequences for victims' mental health and future relationships.

The violence inflicted on Christa Pike falls at the most extreme end of the spectrum of gender-based violence. It is not just that she was a toddler when she was sexually abused for the first time, or that she was raped by three more men before her eighteenth birthday. It is that Christa was forced to cope with her sexual abuse and rape virtually alone, without any of the victim support services that we know are so vital to recovery. Her parents were neglectful at best, and abusive at worst. When Christa developed symptoms of PTSD and bipolar disorder, no one in her life ensured that she received treatment and medication. In short, Christa was consistently failed by the people and systems that should have helped her. Research shows that girls in this situation are disproportionately likely to be incarcerated.

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It matters that Christa was a teenaged girl, rather than an adult man, at the time of the crime. We agree with the non-partisan Council on Criminal Justice, which reported in 2024 that “[w]hile men also experience childhood abuse and other forms of interpersonal victimization, these risk factors function differently in the lives of women and increase their risk for mental health challenges, substance use disorders, and intimate partner violence, all of which can contribute to their involvement in the criminal justice system.” So while we do not argue that Christa’s life should be spared solely on account of her gender, her experiences of abuse and violence happened *because* she was a girl, at a time when states provided them with far less protection.

Relating to the crime itself, we are struck by two facts. First, the crime was committed nearly a year to the day of when Christa was violently raped by a stranger. We support the finding of Dr. Bethany Brand that this anniversary would have rekindled the trauma of the rape, and that it would have affected Christa’s mental health. Second, Christa did not commit this crime alone. She accompanied two other teenagers, one of whom was her abusive intimate partner. That partner, Tadarly Shipp, received a more lenient sentence—and is now eligible for parole—because he was only 17 at the time of the crime, while she was 18. This disparity in outcomes is deeply troubling, particularly given the abusive character of his relationship with Christa.

We do not minimize the seriousness of the crime that Christa committed. Nor does the sexual violence that Christa experienced at such a young age excuse her crime. But it does provide an explanation for how she came to commit that crime, a context for trying to understand what otherwise might seem incomprehensible. No dispassionate observer could look at the circumstances of Christa’s life, including her age at the time of the crime and her mental illness, and believe that she is among the most depraved and irredeemable offenders for whom the death penalty is traditionally reserved. Indeed, her execution would shock the sensibilities of most people who were familiar with the facts of her life.

Victims of violence are complex. A survivor is capable of acts of violence even while she is still a victim of serious trauma. Christa Pike suffered horrific physical and sexual abuse and serious trauma throughout her life, struggled with mental illness, and was a victim long before she became a defendant. Christa Pike has experienced a life-time of punishment and it is now time for mercy. We respectfully urge you to commute her death sentence to life imprisonment.

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Thank you for your serious consideration of this matter.
